

- 500,000 student records over the last 6 academic years
- Some topline findings:

 Students in our opportunity programs (CSTEP/TRIO/RAM) have a significantly higher probability of being retained and graduating

Retention Study Findings

- Significant differences in retention and graduation rates across groups
- Secular slowdown in credits earned in years 3 and 4
- Academic Warning has had little or no effect on student success as defined by GPA or retention rates
- Probability of student success across the College is tied to "academic momentum"

Retention Study Recommendations

- Restructure Academic Warning along the lines of an intrusive advising model
- Implement a real-time Early Warning system
- Use FYE courses to share information on student success, early warning, etc.
- Create advising intervention system for "Murky Middle" students (2.0-2.5 GPA)
- Deliver better recognition and support for advisors









on real outcomes, not rankings. in short, the metrics that natter. A great college experience is about "goodness of fit." What are the metrics that matter to you? These is no single, correct answer. And this is the best time of your life to explore options that may lead you to a field about which you are passionate

Think clearly about why you are parsuing a degree and ask yourself what experience you are hoping for, and what academic programs fit your interests. How important are campus life and extracurricular activities? If possible, visit the campuses you are considering. Be sure to ask questions ---

your questions, not those of your parents and friends. And a word of emition for purcents, Remander that it's your student who will be going to college, not you. To the extent that your finances allow, mide, but don't decide for your student. Parents often ask about things that do not growtly affect student achieve ment, such as food service and parking. Keep in mind that student success is ultimately

academic success. Students should inquire about the student/faculty ratio and what majory are offered. other than their initial cheice. Remember, many students change majors after arriving. Does the college offer applied learning opportunities such as undergraduate research, internships, fellowships, community engagement, and service learning? These are increasingly important to prospective employers. Ask what unique services or programs the college offers. Of course, students will also

want to know how much it all

will cost and what their degree will bring after graduation. As reflected in a recent Gallup Poll, some question the value of higher education. The truth is that now, more than ever, the college experience and the returns of a degree make it a great investment for millions of young people.
