

Journal Articles

Before you read the article, note the following:

- 1. **Article title:** Carefully read the title! Often, you can select or ignore an article just by the information contained in the title.
- 2. **Article date**: Did your professor specify a publication date range for articles (such as the past 10 years)? Topics like technology and healthcare that change often will need more recent research.
- 3. When picking a journal article, check that the following match your research needs:
 - a. Location of study.
 - b. Time period of study.
 - c. Verify that it is a scholarly source (on the FSC database, select scholarly or peer-reviewed).
- 4. The abstract is a brief summary of the article, covering the main points. The abstract can help you to decide if the article will be useful.
- 5. After reading the abstract, skim the article and closely read sections that pertain to your research.
- 6. Take notes (include the page or paragraph numbers!) of information that will help you fulfill the assignment guidelines. You can refer to this when you are writing your essay.
- 7. **Remember to cite** direct quotes (the source's words), paraphrases (source's ideas put into your own words), and statistics that you borrow from the source.
