Topic: Run-on Sentences

Definition: A run-on sentence is two or more complete sentences joined without correct words and punctuation.

Explanation: Two sentences may be joined into a compound sentence in one of the three following ways:

- a semicolon: ;
- a comma and a conjunction: , and / but / or
- a semicolon and an adverbial connective: ; nevertheless / otherwise / therefore / consequently / however / furthermore / moreover.
 - o The adverbial connective is followed by a comma.
- Two sentences may also remain separated as two individual sentences.

Examples

• Incorrect: Mary enjoyed her spring break however she had studying to do.

• Correct: Mary enjoyed her spring break; she had studying to do.

Mary enjoyed her spring break, but she had studying to do.

Mary enjoyed her spring break; however, she had studying to do.
